How many electric cars are there in Ethiopia?

There are at least 1.2 million vehicles across Ethiopia, and only a small fraction are electric ones. Businessman Yared Alemayehu bought a Chinese-made electric vehicle that he had hoped to use for a taxi service. He knew the car had a mechanical defect, but he believed it could be fixed. A mechanic disagreed.
